

ROCHESTER,  
WITH STROOD, FRINDSBURY, AND UPNOR.

ROCHESTER is a city and parliamentary borough, consisting of the parishes of St. Nicholas, St. Margaret and the Cathedral church precinct, on the south bank of the navigable river Medway and of the parish of Strood and parts of the parishes of Chatham and Frindsbury on the north bank and is the head of a Bishop's see, also a polling place for the Mid division of the county and in the lathe of Aylesford and Medway union, while Strood and Frindsbury form a part of the North Aylesford union. Rochester is also the seat of a customs port of entry and the head quarters of an inland revenue district and is 29 miles from London, 8 north from Maidstone, 7 south-east from Gravesend, 27 north-west from Canterbury and 42 in the same direction from Dover, on the high road to which it stands; there is a station on the North Kent line at Strood and a second on the London, Chatham and Dover railway at Rochester bridge. The city, which is built on a somewhat irregular plan, and extends for a considerable distance along the bank of the Medway, is connected with Strood by a handsome and substantial iron structure of three arches, erected in 1857 and 1858, at a cost of £200,000, defrayed partly by accumulated funds arising from the bridge estate, the remainder having been borrowed on mortgage under the Medway Conservancy Act, 1881, the corporation surrendered for £65,000 to the Medway Conservancy Board, March 1882, all their ancient privileges and superintendence over the river Medway.

The first charter of incorporation was granted by Henry II. A.D. 1165: the municipal body now comprises a mayor, recorder, 6 aldermen and 18 councillors; quarter sessions are held here and there is also a commission of the peace for the city: it is well lighted with gas and supplied with water from a reservoir at Gillingham, belonging to the Chatham and Rochester Water works.

Rochester was called Dourbryf by the Britons, which signifies a swift stream, in allusion to the rapidity of the Medway. The Romans called it Durobrovis and Durobrovum: by the Saxons it was denominated Hroffeceaster, from the name of one Hroffe or Roffe, who erected some buildings here and from castrum or castle, which implies that the Romans had a camp there. Ethelbert the Britwald and King of Kent founded here a Bishop's see in 604, when Justus, who was sent from Rome, A.D. 601, to assist St. Augustine in the conversion of the Anglo-Saxons to Christianity, was appointed the first bishop. In 676 the city was destroyed by Ethelred, King of Mercia and again by the Danes in 839: being rebuilt it was besieged by these marauders in 885, but relieved by King Alfred: in 986 it was attacked a second time by King Ethelred: in 998 sacked by the Danes and at a later period, in 1088, William Rufus, after a six weeks' siege, took the castle.

The city was nearly destroyed by fire in 1130 and 1137, and in 1174 the city and part of the cathedral were burned. In 1215 the castle was taken by King John after a siege of twelve months; in 1216 it surrendered to the Dauphin, Louis of France and in 1217 was retaken. Simon de Montfort, Earl of Leicester, the founder of our Parliamentary liberties, made an attempt upon the castle in 1264; and failing to capture it, held possession of the city and despoiled the church; Wat Tyler, in his insurrection of 1381, also attacked the castle, and here too Jack Cade's rabble rout dispersed themselves. Queen Elizabeth visited the city in 1573; Charles II. slept here on his landing at the Restoration, and in 1688 King James II. on his abdication, secretly embarked at Rochester in his flight to the Continent.

The city has been well fortified since the attack of the Dutch in Charles II.'s time, when they sailed up the Medway and burnt several vessels.

The cathedral of St. Andrew, Rochester, was begun by Bishop Gundulph, 1077-1108, but is of various ages, and consists of choir, with transepts and chapels, nave, aisles, transepts with transeptal chapels on the eastern side and a central tower; adjoining the north end of the great transept on the east is Gundulph's tower, a massive square building 24 feet square, with walls 6 feet in thickness, probably once forming a transept tower, as at Exeter; and at the west end are two small towers. Ernulph, the architect of great works, while Abbot of Peterborough and Prior of Canterbury, completed the church, built the dormitory, infirmary and Chapter house and lengthened the nave by two bays eastward, 1115-25: the narrow Early English choir, of which William de Hoo, when sacrist, is the reputed builder, was first used May 9th, 1227, and is raised considerably above the nave, and approached by a flight of steps, each side has four compartments with lancet arches, springing from clustered shafts of marble: the choir was refitted and newly paved in 1743 and during the restoration by the late Sir Gilbert Scott R.A. in 1874-5 very much of the original woodwork of the 13th century, with other portions added in the 16th century, as well as some 14th century wall-painting above the stalls, was carefully preserved and to some extent reproduced: on the south side are three Decorated sedilia, restored in 1825, which mark the ancient site of the high altar, before the old Lady Chapel was thrown into it in the 15th century: the choir transepts were added by William de Hoo, with the offerings made at St. William's shrine and the north transept is a chapel dedicated to that saint (canonized in 1256); the south transept is roofed with oak, dating from the time of Edward I.: the tower rises from the intersection of the western or great transepts, with the nave and choir and was

originally built in 1352; by Bishop Shepey and Hamo de Hethe, consisted of a low tower with a short and inelegant though venerable spire, added in 1479; the modern debased and incongruous structure was erected by Mr. Cottingham, in 1827 and rests on arches, springing from fine clustered

banded shafts, with an open roof, introduced in 1840: the north wing of the main transept, Early English, was built by the monk, Richard de Eastgate, sacrist and Thomas de Meopham: and the south wing by the monk Richard de Waldene, about the year 1200: on the western side of the south wing is St. Mary's chapel of three bays, now the consistory court and on the eastern side the muniment room: the nave is the most ancient of any in the kingdom and (except the two easternmost arches on each side, rebuilt probably with the intention of its complete reconstruction and the windows, which are almost all of Decorated or Perpendicular date), it is wholly Norman; the arcades, therefore, consist of five Norman and two Early English arches, on piers, some octagonal and others with attached shafts; above is a triforium of semi-circular arches opening into the aisles, but extending along the six western bays only and over this rises a lofty clerestory, with windows, of late Perpendicular date; the rich open timber roof is supported on corbels, with figures of angels bearing shields: the north aisle was begun by Richard de Eastgate and completed by William Axenham in the 13th century; the south aisle was built in 1240: the crypt, which once contained nine altars, is partly Saxon and partly Early English and was completed by William de Hoo in 1227; it extends under the whole length of the choir: the west front is a very noble specimen of Norman work and its doorway is altogether unrivalled as an example of that style; it consists of a deeply recessed semi-circular arch, enriched with beautiful mouldings of four orders, on shafts with highly elaborated capitals; on two of the shafts are figures of Henry I. and Queen Maud and the lintel bears reliefs of Our Lord and the Apostles, with figures of cherubim and evangelistic symbols: the large Perpendicular west window of eight lights, is of the date of Henry VII.; of the four arcaded octagonal turrets which once adorned the front, only one retains its original pinnacle; the whole façade has several ranges of arches, some semi-circular and some intersecting, but interrupted by the inserted window: the west ends of the aisles have enriched Norman windows, but the rest of the exterior of the nave is plain: the principal monuments in the cathedral are as follows: North-east transept -- Bishop Walter de Merton, drowned in 1278, a fine tomb dating from the transitional period between Early English and Decorated, with pyramidal canopies, restored by Hussey in 1849: Bishop John Lowe ob. 1467, an altar tomb; here also was the shrine of St. William of Rochester, a baker of Perth, murdered outside the walls of Rochester, when on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, in 1201, by a servant of Prior Silvester and canonized in 1256: north side of choir -- Bishop John de Shepey, ob. 1361, an effigy and canopy, with original colouring, discovered in 1825: Presbytery, north side -- Bishop Gundulph, ob. 1107, a simple stone cist; and Bishop Thomas Inglethorpe, ob. 1291, with a canopied effigy of Petworth marble: south side -- Bishop Laurence de St. Martin, ob. 1274, with a perfect effigy, beneath an Early Decorated canopy; and Bishop Gilbert de Glanvill, ob. 1214, a coped tomb of Petworth marble, much mutilated: south choir aisle -- Bishop John de Bradfield, ob. 1283, a mutilated tomb, with canopy and effigy: north-east transept aisle --

Bishop Hamo de Hethe, ob. 1352, with a rich canopy of Decorated work: nave -- tomb of Lord Henniker, ob. 1803; and an incised slab to Bishop John Fisher ob. 1535: there is also a monument to Richard Watts, ob. 1579, the founder of the charity bearing his name and a brass tablet to the late Charles Dickens, whose boyhood was passed in Rochester and who died at Gad's Hill place, near here. The total length of the cathedral is 310 feet, the nave being 159 feet long by 65ft. 4in. broad and 55ft. high and the choir 110ft. 6in. long, or, with the lady chapel, about 164ft.; the main transept extends for 122ft. 3in. the choir transept for 92ft. and the west front has an extreme breadth of 94ft.; the central tower is 156 feet high and Gundulph's tower 95ft.: at the south-east corner are some Norman remains of the ancient chapter house and cloisters; the former, partly erected by Bishop Hamo de Hethe and now rebuilt has a very beautiful west front, elaborately carved with zodiacal signs: the doorway, attributed to Bishop Shepey, 1352, is a rich work, set between two highly-sculptured arches and represents the church as a prelate and the Jewish Synagogue as a woman blindfold; above are figures, apparently of ecclesiastics, accompanied by symbolical designs: the cloister occupies an unusual position on the south-east side of the choir, no other cloister adjoining that part of a cathedral: to its southern wall was attached the refectory, built by Silvester,

the prior after 1177 and there still exist remains of a passage through the wall to the pulpit, as at Chester and Beaulieu, Hants. A sum of £14,000 was spent between 1827 and 1834 in restorations; in 1840 the whole interior of the cathedral was renovated and in 1870 a further scheme of restoration was partially carried out, but £20,000 is still required for its completion. The library of upwards of 1,100 volumes, contains some ancient MSS. and among others, the celebrated register of the diocese, the *Textus Roffensis*, A.D. 1120 and the *Custumale Roffense*, composed about 1320. The establishment of the cathedral consists of a bishop, dean, archdeacon, four canons, three minor canons, six lay clerks, twelve choristers, with a Grammar school attached, having on the Foundation a master and twenty scholars. The gross income of the Dean and Chapter has been returned at £7,178 per annum and the nett income at £5,106. The bishop's see comprises the archdeaconry of Rochester in this county and the archdeaconry of Kingston and Southwark in Surrey. Three gates of the Priory remain: -- the Prior's, an embattled tower on the south-east: the Deanery or Sacristy, adjoining the north transept; and the College Yard, or Cemetery Gate, which led from the Market cross to the west door. Of the three precinct gates, the north, or St. William's, is destroyed, but the embattled arch of the south cloister still exists; the almonry, on the south-west has been converted into a prebendal house.

Rochester had formerly four parish churches, but the site of St. Mary's is unknown.

The church of St. Margaret is a building, now chiefly in the Italian style, having been wholly rebuilt, with the exception of the tower, at the beginning of the present century: the tower, placed at the western end, is a plain battlemented

structure of Perpendicular date, with a turret containing 6 bells and forms a striking feature in the landscape, overlooking the meadows which slope down to the river Medway: in the church is the brass with an effigy in ecclesiastical vestments, of a former vicar, who lived about the year A.D. 1450: the brass is a palimpsest, the other side exhibiting a similar figure, in a somewhat different dress. In 1872 the church was restored and re-pewed and a stained east window inserted: there are 900 sittings, 450 being free. The churchyard, picturesquely situated, is now closed for burials, the parish having, in 1865, provided a cemetery on the Maidstone road. The register dates from the year 1569. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £340, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter and held, since 1878, by the Rev. George Eden Frederick Peake M.A. of St. Mary Hall, Oxford.

St. Nicholas' church is a plain building, chiefly of flints, in the Decorated and Perpendicular styles, erected in 1421 and greatly enlarged in 1624 and consists of chancel, nave, aisles, small low tower, of Perpendicular date, on the west side of the north aisle, containing 2 bells: the arcades of the nave consist of 5 pointed arches on either side, springing from circular columns, with square capitals: there are several brasses and tablets to the Foord and Gordon families and a curious octagonal stone font. The register dates from the year 1574. The living is a vicarage, with that of St. Clement annexed; net yearly value, £250, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Rochester and held by the Rev. William Savery Hill M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge.

St. Clement's church has been demolished and the parish is united to that of St. Nicholas.

St. Peter's is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1860; the church, erected in 1839, at a cost of £6,000, is a building of stone and brick, in the Decorated style, consisting of chancel, nave and south aisle: the east and west windows are memorials to members of the Nicholson family. There are 800 sittings, 561 being free. The register dates from the year 1860. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £300, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Rochester and held, since 1860, by the Rev. Henry Frederick Phillips B.A. of University College, Oxford and Hon. Canon of Rochester. The population in 1871 was 4,614.

There are Wesleyan, Congregational and Reformed Methodist chapels, a meeting house for the Society of Friends and a Synagogue, erected by Simon Magnus, a merchant of Chatham, to the memory of his son.

St. Margaret's Cemetery, situated on the Maidstone road, is six acres in extent and has two mortuary chapels.

St. Nicholas Cemetery, situated on the Maidstone road, has an area of four acres, with mortuary chapels.

The Guildhall, erected in 1687, contains some portraits of considerable merit. The Corn Exchange was rebuilt in 1870-1. The markets at Rochester are -- for corn on Tuesdays, and for cattle on the fourth Tuesday in each month. A fair is held at Rochester on the 18th of May and at Strood on the 26th, 27th and 28th of August.

The Gaol is used for the purpose of the local jurisdiction.

The County Court Offices, in Eastgate, erected in 1862, is a building of brick, in a modified Tudor style.

The Theatre is principally supported by the garrison. There is a reading-room and library of the Rochester Church of England Institute in the High street and another reading-room and library at the Corn Exchange.

The Working Men's Institute, Borstal, built in 1880, by Samuel Barker Booth esq. contains reading and amusement rooms.

Fort Pitt, overlooking the Medway, was erected in the early part of this century and is now used as a military hospital, the original building having been considerably enlarged.

The Poor Travellers' House, founded and endowed in 1579 by Richard Watts, for six poor travellers, "not being common rogues nor proctors;" each traveller receives a night's lodging, a supper and fourpence on leaving in the morning: the revenues, which at the time of the donor's death were small, have so increased as to amount at the present time to £3,500 per annum; in July, 1855, a scheme was sanctioned by the Court of Chancery for building almshouses for ten men and ten women, fourteen of whom were to receive £30 a-year each, a head nurse £60 a-year, a porter £50 and four nurses £50 a-year each; suitable buildings were accordingly erected in the Maidstone road, at a cost of nearly £10,000, in the Tudor style, with two fine gateways, each costing £350, from designs by Mr. Webb, of London; the scheme likewise empowered the trustees to give a sum of £4,000 towards the erection of a general hospital (since built), for the benefit of the city and neighbourhood and a sum of £1,000 per annum towards its support.

St. Bartholomew's Hospital was originally founded by Gundulph, Bishop of Rochester, in 1078, for the benefit of lepers returning from the Crusades and after being many years in abeyance was reconstituted in 1858 and a general hospital erected on the New road; this institution was opened in 1863 and is supported from the revenues of St. Bartholomew's Hospital grant of £1,000 per annum from Watts' charity, as above mentioned and by voluntary subscriptions.

The House of Industry, founded by Sir J. Hayward, of Rochester, in the year 1823, will hold six poor women.

St. Catherine's Hospital, Star Hill, originally founded by Symond Potyn, of Rochester, in 1316, for lepers. is now appropriated as the residence of twenty-two aged females, each with a pension of £28 per annum.

Hawkins' charity, founded by Sir John Hawkins, in 1592 and situated in Chatham Intra, is for decayed seamen: the inmates are appointed by the dock authorities; deputy-governor, George Henry Knight.

Other charities, producing £150 yearly are distributed in bread.

Rochester Castle, built by Gundulph, is an ancient edifice, of Norman architecture, near the bridge, with very thick walls of Kentish ragstone: the magnificent keep is one of the finest castellated ruins in the kingdom and consists of a

very large tower, 70 feet square and 104 feet high, with flat buttresses and a turret at each angle, three of these being square and the fourth circular: the interior is divided into two equal parts by an open arcaded wall in each floor, the rooms varying in height from 20 to 32 feet; the second floor seems to have contained the state apartments and exhibits semi-circular arches and pillars of excellent workmanship; in the centre of the keep is a curious well, accessible from every floor: the outer walls of the castle are still, to a great extent, perfect, and the entrances show great ingenuity in the several contrivances adopted for their security; the grounds around the castle, leased to the corporation by the Earl of Jersey, have been laid out as a place for public recreation at a cost of about £2,000.

The area of St. Margaret's parish is 2,492; rateable value, £31,248; population in 1881, 10,203; St. Nicholas, 121 acres; rateable value, £16,594; population in 1881, 3,101; Cathedral precincts, area 7 acres; rateable value, £796; population in 1881, 125.

The municipal and parliamentary limits are co-extensive; the population in 1881 was 21,590.

The above, excluding the Cathedral Church Precinct and including Strood Extra, form the Local Board District of Rochester and Strood.

TROY TOWN is a southern suburb in the parish of St. Margaret; DELCE, half a mile south; BORSTAL, 1 mile south-west.

## SCHOOLS.

The Cathedral Grammar School was founded by King Henry VIII. A.D. 1544. The foundation scholars, who receive free education, are selected, after an examination, by the Dean & Chapter of Rochester, any boy between the ages of nine & fifteen being eligible: there are also four exhibitions, of the yearly value of £40, to be raised to £60 hereafter, paid by the Dean & Chapter & tenable at the Universities; & two Gunsley exhibitions at University College, Oxford, of the yearly value of £25, the electors being the Master & Fellows of the college & each exhibitor is allowed £15 a year from the date of his election to the commencement of his residence at Oxford: annual prizes are also given to those pupils who distinguish themselves most in classics, mathematics & French; Rev. J. Langhorne M.A. late scholar of Christ's College, Cambridge, head master: S. H. Haslam B.A. W. B. Pulling B.A. & W. H. St. John Hope B.A. assistant masters; Herr Piper, foreign languages

Williamson's Free Mathematical school was founded in 1601, by Sir Joseph Williamson & endowed by him with a sum of £5,000, with the object of preparing sons of freemen for the sea service: the benefits of the school are now extended to the sons of burgesses and it has a present income of £1,200 a year.
