S. Austines abbey at Canterbury was suppressed, and the shrine & goods taken to the kings treasurie, as also the shrine of Thomas Becket in the priorie of Christ Church, was likewise taken to the kings vse. This shrine was builded about a mans height, all of stone, then vpwarde of tymber plain, within the which was a chest of yron, conteining the bones of Tho= mas Becket, scul and al, with the wound of his death, and the peece cut out of his scull laide in the same wounde. These bones (by commaundement of the L. Cromwell) were then and there brent, the tymber worke of this shrine, on the outside, was couered with plates of gold, damasked with gold wire, which ground of golde was againe couered with iewels of golde, as rings 10. or 12. cramped with golde wier, into the saide grounde of golde, many of those rings having stones in them, brooches, images, and angels, and other precious stones, and great pearls, &c. The spoile of which shrine, in golde and precious stone, filled two great chestes, such as 6. or 8. stronge men could do no more then conuey one of them at once out of the Church. The monks of that church were commanded to change their habites, into the apparell of secular priests.
